Dear Fellow Old Boy

The Royal Commission of Inquiry into Abuse in Care

Last year a Royal Commission of Inquiry (the Royal Commission) was established to investigate the abuse of people in the care of New Zealand's state and faith-based institutions. Similar Commissions of Inquiry have been held in Australia, Ireland and Canada. However, the Royal Commission here is wider in scope than the overseas examples and will consider physical, emotional and sexual abuse and neglect. The Royal Commission will be inquiring into abuse which took place between 1950 and 1999, and has the discretion to consider events which happened outside that timeframe.

As a faith-based institution, Dilworth, along with other Anglican Schools, supports the Royal Commission. We hope it will allow us to be better informed on how to ensure the safety and wellbeing of students in our care.

Steps we are taking

The Dilworth Trust Board considers all forms of abuse, including physical, emotional and sexual abuse, unacceptable and a breach of trust for which the consequences are profound. As a School we have, and will continue to, regularly review and adopt best practice processes and procedures to provide a safer School environment so the young men in our care can reach their full potential, as envisaged by our Founder.

That is why we did not want to wait for the conclusion of the Royal Commission to update the processes and procedures in our School, considering the learnings from international Commissions of Inquiry.

The Board has obtained the support of independent psychologists and other professionals to review our education systems, policies and programmes. So far, we have:

- Commissioned an independent clinical psychologist to advise the Board and prepare a set of
 protocols, which have been peer-reviewed by independent experts both here and in Australia. The
 protocols set out best practice abuse prevention and outline processes to follow should a former or
 current student come forward with a complaint about physical, emotional or sexual abuse;
- Appointed a special management committee to oversee and implement the programmes and institutional culture required to give effect to the protocols;
- Formed a panel of independent, expert clinical psychologists (the Panel), to provide responses and support as required by any current or past students;
- Made safety improvements to our campuses, as well as updated our existing policies and processes; and
- Provided specific educational training for staff and students on the protocols, reinforcing that abuse in any form, be it physical, emotional or sexual, is not tolerated or permitted at Dilworth.

Support Services

As Old Boys, we know some of us suffered abuse while at school. Mostly this has been physical and emotional, such as bullying and excessive corporal punishment (prohibited from 1987), and also sexual abuse.

On behalf of the Board and the School, I would like to express our deep regret and apologise to those Old Boys whose lives were affected by abuse under our care.

In addition to implementing the processes and procedures identified in the protocols, we are reaching out to Old Boys (for whom we have contact details) to offer the following support services to anyone who suffered abuse of any form while at the School:

- A confidential, free Listening Service which can be promptly arranged for Old Boys if you want to discuss your experiences with an independent clinical psychologist; and
- If you need more support following engagement with the Listening Service, further counselling can be arranged with an independent clinical psychologist at no cost.

You will then be contacted in confidence by an independent clinical psychologist, who is a member of the Panel.
